Probation has evolved from a way to avoid prison to a sanction actually feeding mass incarceration.

Equipped with a new form of artistic expression that has let them see themselves in a whole new way, hundreds of Americans ensnared in this dominant criminal justice sanction set out to blaze a whole new way to reform—only to find themselves transformed by the journey.

As in so many areas, people of color would pioneer an approach that could benefit so many others.

By telling their heartwarming story, this half-hour documentary and its companion book peel back the veil on the little-known nineteenth-century justice system innovation that would eventually spread through most of the world.

THE FILM

Ensnaring almost four million Americans, probation has evolved from a second chance to avoid prison to a sanction actually feeding mass incarceration.

Equipped only with cameras and a technique called “**participatory photography**,” some of these individuals set to change all this—only to find themselves transformed. Their portrayal of their authentic lives aspired to counter the forbidding mugshots typifying media coverage and so help return probation to its roots. The effort itself led the photographers to see themselves and their world in a whole new way.

This half-hour documentary of their heroes’ journey peels back the veil on probation—the little-known domestic innovation that would eventually spread through most of the planet. The film itself warmed hearts in over 180 festivals around the world during 2021-2023, amassing 60 awards and 15 additional award nominations.

WHY THIS FILM

We Americans lock up far more of our people than any country on earth. Observers on both the right and left have long sought a way out of this situation that does not endanger the community.

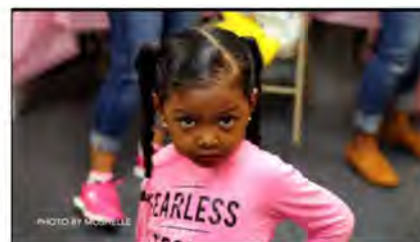
The nonprofit Seeing for Ourselves believes that if probation could once again **rehabilitate rather than punish**, it would be viewed more widely as an effective alternative to jail or prison. And then the numbers incarcerated would begin to drop.

Creating a new public image of the millions serving a term of probation is the first step towards this end—and already underway, thanks to the initiative portrayed in the film. *In a Whole New Way* aims at amplifying the process.

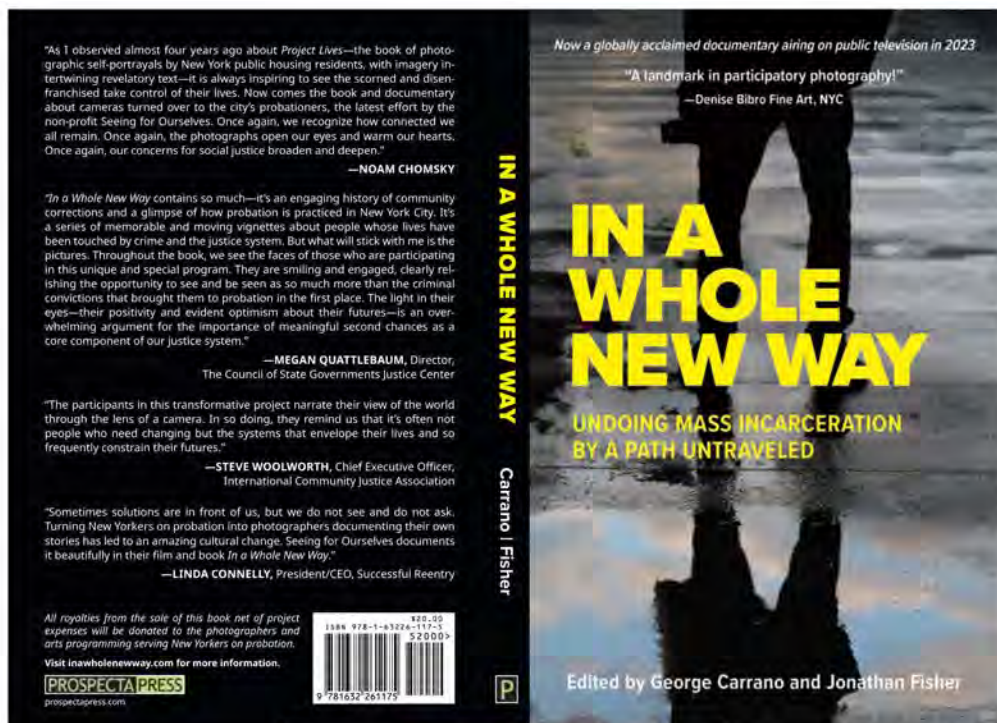
THE TEAM

Interview Resources

1. How did the idea for this book and film come about?

Jonathan's role in this second photography project was the storyteller, as it was in the initiative that led to Seeing for Ourselves's first book, *Project Lives*. He was at work writing this new work when in the spring of 2020 the pandemic brought publishing to a halt. George told him to think of something else.

2. What made him decide that the something else would be a documentary?

Jonathan had had interviews conducted with the participants in the program for use in writing the book. As he's based in a suburb of Portland, Maine—three hundred miles from New York City—he had had Chelsea Davis, who ran the program so well on the ground, capture her Q&As on video. The material was so striking that he realized others could be as captivated as he was by the participants' magnetic personalities. He began watching and re-watching Ken Burns's *The Vietnam War* to see how it could be done.

3. How many strings had to be pulled to have a book and film of such sensitive matters see daylight?

As a former top official of New York's Metropolitan Transportation Authority, George knows how to navigate around obstacles. He had successfully converted the subways to automated fare collection, a \$2 billion effort.

4. Does the participatory photography program portrayed in the book and film still exist?

Indeed it does, having been institutionalized as a permanent offering of the NYC probation agency.

5. What do you hope to achieve with this book and film?

Promote decarceration and the participants' own stellar work.

6. Is the book and film's reception as expected?

Like *Project Lives*, the film has won fans across the political spectrum. This was exactly the hope! Such support marks the surest path to criminal justice system reform. We hope to duplicate this when the book is published in June 2023.

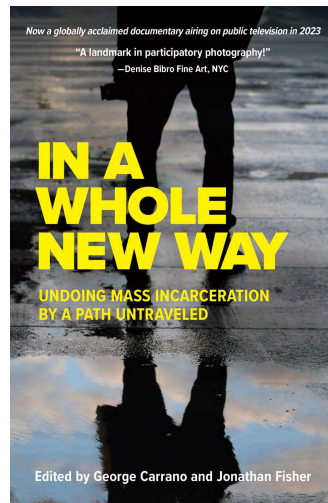

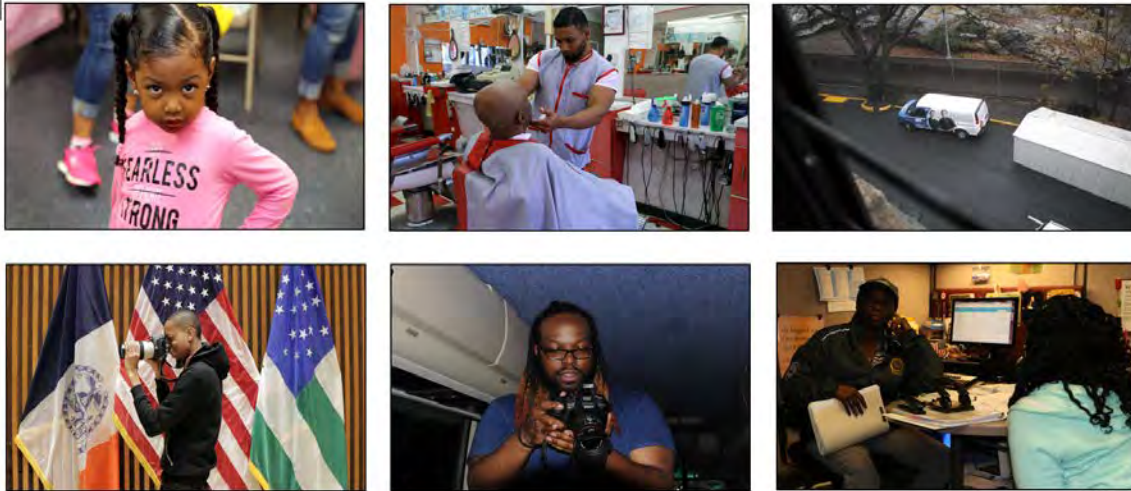

In a Whole New Way takes you on a remarkable journey into a world turned inside out, where the camera's subject becomes the storyteller. Participatory photography — of which this collection marks one of the largest efforts anywhere, a fitting sequel to the editors' award-winning *Project Lives* (powerHouse, 2015) and the companion to the globally acclaimed eponymous documentary airing soon on PBS — approaches a new visual medium, a universal language speaking across borders and cultures.

By using donated cameras and their own cell phones as a window into the heart of the criminal justice system and a creative instrument of hope, the courageous souls who set out on a daunting mission — to change how their neighbors, friends, relations, and very lives are viewed by America — may help undo mass incarceration.
